MORNING SESSION

9:15 am. Clock Tools Used in the Trade – Jeff Adams

This presentation will focus on the tools used in the trade, and encompassing the needs of the ambitious collector wanting to maintain their collection to the person wanting to open their own shop. What you will need to get started, what you may ultimately need, and those "goodies" you will eventually want. While setting up to do clock repair, how to prioritize the expenses for acquiring the proper tools. Also, the need to understand that some tools must be made, not bought.

Jeff was trained for about six years by Dan Neid, owner and operator of the York Time Institute, York, PA. For the last twenty years Jeff has pretty much worked on anything that ticks, and is a former NAWCC Field Suitcase Instructor.

11:00 am Some Basic and Advanced Repair Problems – John Losch

John will discuss bushing mistakes and tricky bushings (and their consequences), several repairs to spring barrels, setting up to re-pivot wheels, use of a defective depthing tool (most are), really cleaning pivot holes, and more as time allows. Questions will be welcome.

John Losch is a semi-retired clockmaker who recently passed his milestone 70th year at the bench. In his early years he worked at the Howard Clock factory in one of its final iterations. John was associated with the Collection of Historical Scientific Instruments at Harvard University as a restorer for thirty-five years. He taught at the NAWCC School of Horology. Concurrent with those associations he ran his own clock repair and restoration business for many years. Now John writes and lectures occasionally, and serves as a trustee of the Willard House and Clock Museum.

AFTERNOON SESSION

1:00 pm A Connoisseur's Look at a Willard Eight-day Tall Clock – *Robert C. Cheney*


Robert C. Cheney of Brimfield, Massachusetts will be our after lunch speaker. By request, Robert will examine a Willard tall clock to demonstrate his procedure in determining authenticity and writing a proper catalogue description for museum curatorial work. He will discuss the differences between a description for an auction catalogue and that for museum records. For those of you who have attended one of Robert's "Gallery Walks" while he was Director of Clocks, Watches and Scientific Instruments at Skinner, you will recognize the procedure as he dismantles the clock into components and goes into a forensic examination of each component, the case including the hood, the dial, the movement, etc., and how they all need to relate for a "straight" or "clean" clock verdict in a report. Regardless of your interests, there is always something to be learned from these "hands-on" demonstrations.

Robert C. Cheney is well known to Chapter 8 members and the wider horological world. He has served as conservator and consultant to over thirty-five museums, and a Board member to three horological museums including the Willard House and Clock Museum. Robert has lectured extensively in the U. S., Canada and the UK, has written a book with Philip Zea, "Clock Making in New England, 1725-1825." He has been a high-end dealer for private clients and has provided collection management services to private, museum and corporate clients alike. Robert is recently retired as Director of Clocks, Watches and Scientific Instruments at Skinner in Marlborough, and is presently Executive Director and Curator of the Willard House and Clock Museum, Grafton.
